fossils I found on Mt. Stephen were causing quite a rippa
amongst geologists. Dr. Pennington first described them,
when of this our (Canadian) palaeontologist Mr. Whiteaves
learned he felt very "sore" that he had not the privilege & honor
and now Wolcott of the U.S. Geol. Survey discussed them &
criticized Dr. Pennington's paper. I was glad to get
from Mr. Tyrell Wolcott's paper Sep. No. Am. Journal
of Science. -

Thursday 11
cloudy

Day was passed chatting & smoking. At 6-20 PM
we all at North Bay where we change sleepers for the
Toronto one. -

Friday 12
raining

At 5 A.M. in Toronto. I rise at 6-30 breakfast &
at 7-40 A.M. leave for HOME - the magic word &

an hour so that I did not arrive in Fall Hill 11 A.M.
where Timmes awaited me with a conveyance. A
half an hour later I embraced my dear desire.
The boys were not at home but in school as my telegram
announcing my arrival did not arrive till they had left
for school. - So their surprise was great when they
found me at home. There was universal joy -
and altho' there was no sunshine outside but a drizzling
rain yet in the house all was sunshine & happiness. -

I was pleased to find Julie (Pennington) still with Marie
I thought that she had probably returned home to Canada
before my arrival. Of course there was
much to relate and I was busy talking & narrating.
After coffee I called on Father, mother & Augustus.

October

Although I am almost continually relating nevertheless often immediately after supper said - O Papa noch mehr erzählen - To their enjoyment I narrate till I am quite hoarse. Events of my life among the Indians together with the habits customs & traditions of the latter interests the boys the most.

Saturday 13
cloudy

Boys arranging my books & papers. -
My home has undergone a great change since my absence. The tight board fence in front has been replaced by a neat picket one; having acquired (bought) from Father the $\frac{1}{2}$ acre garden adjoining mine - & the board fence being there also removed so that now my humble cozy home stands in three quarters of an acre of a beautiful garden. My good man has had her hands full this autumn directing everything & doing a great deal herself. - I wish for no more pleasant home than I now have. -

M. A. Abby calls in the evening & altho' I was glad to see him yet he spoiled for me an evening that I intended devoting with the boys to music.

Sunday 14
cloudy
after five

I spent an hour in the forenoon with father & mother. In the afternoon Julia, Maria the boys & I go to wheelman's old shop to see the canvas boat of the boys and built by them. I was pleased to see that they had made so creditable a job of it. -

On our way we view the various new buildings which have gone up & are in course of erection since my absence. They all are unmistakable index of the prosperity of the village. -

The evening was mostly devoted to music. Maria, Max, Julius & I playing several pieces together, two guitars, flute and piano. - Afterwards Maria & I together on the piano -
